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

Dental Hygiene students serve patients amid pandemic

When the world shut down in March and everyone was sent home due to the Coronavirus epidemic, Dental Hygiene students at Sheridan College wondered how they were going to finish their education. Sara Beres, director of the Dental Hygiene Program at SC, and the Dental Hygiene faculty completed as much of the program as possible through distance learning, but the students were required to do in-person clinicals in order to complete their programs.

Students and faculty were back on campus at the end of June. New guidelines for the safety of patients, faculty and students had to be implemented immediately, including the use of face shields and improved intraoral suction to eliminate aerosol production in the clinic. When face shields that were ordered failed to arrive in time for the clinics to open, the SC engineering department pitched in and

produced enough shields with their 3D printers so the clinics could begin on time. According to Director Beres, "it was definitely a great collaborative effort that allowed the clinic to reopen!"

After implementing a symptom and temperature screening process, the clinic was able to open. The class of 2020 was able to complete their requirements in an intense two-week session, took their board exams, and are able to start their new careers.

It was a challenge to be able to complete the training the Dental Hygiene students needed, but with innovative thinking and a great group effort, the class of 2020 has graduated and the class of 2021 will be ready for their second year. With lessons learned, the Dental Hygiene program is ready to succeed no matter what happens in this unpredictable year!
